



Pastor cons woman

A Grahamstown (Makhanda) woman has opened a case against a Port Elizabeth pastor after he tricked her into forking out R5000 to bring better luck to her and her family.

When Nontobeko Mazwai* was invited by a friend to witness the power of a visiting pastor, she was impressed by what she'd heard about him, blown away by what she saw – and desperate for her life situation to change for the better.

It started when Gumbi's friend told her about a miracle that Pastor X* had performed for a family in Extension 4, who had asked him to help reverse their bad luck.

"He went to the house, went straight to a wardrobe, reached in and took out a snake," Gumbi related what she'd been told by her friend.

Nontobeko* believed her family needed such a pastor in their home and perhaps turn her contract job in Port Elizabeth into a permanent one.

So she went to a church in Extension 9 to witness his powers. The service, Nontobeko said, was enough to persuade

her to allow him to pray for her – "privately, because this problem is sensitive".

After a complicated ritual, she was convinced more than ever that she needed help and invited him home.

He ordered the family to place five envelopes, each containing R1000, inside a circle of 12 burning candles.

Soon he said more cash was needed to counteract those wishing them harm. In fact, he said, to make sure the bad luck disappeared for good, they needed to add R300 000.

The family didn't have the money and, after a few days of not hearing from the pastor, surmised they might have been tricked.

Nontobeko opened a case at the Grahamstown Police Station and contacted *Grocott's Mail*.

Grocott's Mail's emailed questions to the pastor were not responded to. When this reporter phoned his number, his call was dropped.

No comment on the case had been received from the police at the time of publishing.

RU Harassment Manager

Dr Zethu Mkhize has been appointed as a Harassment and Discrimination Manager at Rhodes University. The position, based in the Directorate for Equity and Institutional Transformation, was in response to a recommendation of the University's Sexual Violence Task Team (SVTT).

Mkhize's responsibilities include transformation, advocacy and awareness-raising about harassment, discrimination, sexual assault and violence.

"My role is to provide a safe haven to those who have been wronged and to advise them about options going forward. In such situations, I assess not only what might have happened, but how the person feels and thinks about the situation," she said.

Mkhize has a PhD from the University of South Africa, where she researched the role of social work in a child-headed household. She has a Masters from the University of Zululand

where she also lectured for a number of years and was Project Manager for the institution's HIV & Aids project. She was Dean of Students at the university until 2015.

"My expertise relates to being responsive to the psychosocial needs of individuals and any challenge that might interfere with their social functioning. Harassment and ... upset a person's rhythm of life within their living spaces. It is therefore critical that intervention be offered immediately," Mkhize said.

Her vision is to see harassment, discrimination, sexual assault and violence referral processes within the University being more clearly defined and well communicated.

"We are looking forward to Dr Mkhize's positive contribution to the University in strengthening our ongoing programme against sexual and gender-based violence," Rhodes University Vice Chancellor, Dr Sizwe Mabizela said.

Toilet time bomb

Sun City is an informal settlement below Hooggenoeg in Grahamstown (Makhanda). It is speculated that between 300 and 500 people call the area home. The settlement was built on top of a landfill, and has no formal sewer services. Community members use bucket toilets, and have two water taps.

On Wednesday 19 September, *Grocott's Mail* visited the area.

"Our issue is our taps and our buckets", said Sun City resident Patrick Roman. "Our buckets [are] full."

Roman said it had been three to four months since the buckets were collected, and residents had resorted to dumping their buckets in the adjacent veld at night.

Ward 4 Councillor Brian Fargher visits Sun City often. "My ward borders on this area and I've become progressively concerned about it," he said.

Makana's acting director of Infrastructure, Kelelo Makgoka, said Sun City was not a formalised area because it was built on a dump site.

In 2009, according to municipal reports, the area was commissioned to become a landfill; however, residents say

claim they have been living there for more than 30 years.

"The area was closed and people were removed to Mayfield and Hooggenoeg. But some people moved back, sold their houses and started Sun City informal settlement," said Makgoka.

"The municipality is unable to put services there", he said. "Which is your sewer, your water as well as proper electricity, and roads."

"The municipality has put temporary sanitation like your bucket system there, and we put two if not three communal taps to provide for basic services."

Makgoka stated that Sun City was a key issue brought to his attention when he took office two months ago. He visited the area on 17 August. Residents said that their waste was not collected regularly, and one of the two taps was broken.

"The last time we went to Sun City to collect [waste] was 18 August," said Makgoka.

"In theory we are supposed to be going fortnightly but because the municipality is experiencing financial challenges and the truck [is not working], [collection] isn't

happening on a regular basis."

"It appears that no sewage buckets have been collected in the last three months," said Fargher following a visit this past week.

Fargher added that he previously queried this officials and received confirmation that due to issues with the sanitation truck no sewage had been collected for almost three months.

Makgoka confirmed residents' woes that out of two communal taps, only one was functional. The broken tap was leaking and required another fitting on the tap's head in order to dispense water.

"It's only one tap in a community of plus-minus 300 people," said Makgoka.

Grocott's Mail spoke to a resident who took matters into his own hands after waiting weeks for municipal services.

Freddie Smith lives next to the broken tap in Sun City. After seeing how much water was being wasted, Smith made a new fitting out of pipes and plastic.

"It's always stories, stories, stories [with the municipality]," he said.

"The issue here is that peo-

ple are really poor. They have no income, and are struggling with sanitation and water."

The area poses an extreme health hazard to residents, including water- and food-borne illnesses such as cholera and hepatitis A.

Makgoka said municipal and government programmes were needed to combat these issues.

"Future plans are formally to remove them from that place: it's a landfill site, for heaven's sake! It's a cocktail of health disasters! We need to educate our people," he said.

"We saw quite a disturbing scene at one point," said Fargher.

"Where [residents] are throwing used nappies on top of the roofs of houses and the [maggots breeding] in those nappies are falling through the roofs.

"This is a community that is fed up, so we have social unrest that's just bubbling under the surface."

On Friday 21 September, the Minister of Public Service and Administration, Ayanda Dlodlo, is scheduled to visit Sun City.

Grocott's Mail will continue to report.





Monthly debate series launches at Albany Rec

The first in #TheDebate2019 – a series of monthly debates leading up to next year's national elections – took place on Wednesday night at the Albany Recreation Hall. Panellists were Public Service Accountability Monitor (PSAM) Jay Kruuse, Makana Mayor Nomhle Gaga and Graham-

stown Residents Association Chairperson Philip Machanick.

Chaired by Yvonne Phyllis, lecturer in the Rhodes University Department of Politics and International Studies, the topic was 'Makana: Should residents withhold rates?' with Governance and accountability the underlying issue.

Most residents of the residents who braved the wintery weather expressed frustration at the state of the city, and poor communication from councillor and officials about the problems they as residents were experiencing.

The Mayor answered residents' questions and faced their criticisms, with many of

the comments and questions directed to her rather than the other panellists.

While PSAM and the GRA urged continued constructive engagement with public officials, along with pressure to perform, invited speakers from the floor, Ayanda Kota, of the Unemployed People's Movement and Ron Weissen-

berg were united in calling for an immediate diversion of rates to an NGO, and the dissolution of the municipality.

The Debate is a monthly event, on Wednesdays mid-month. Local concerns will be the lens on the national issues of Health, Safety and crime, Land, Education and Economy. Partners in the project are

Rhodes Music Radio, Radio Grahamstown, Rhodes School of Journalism and Media Studies, Rhodes Department of Politics and International Studies and *Grocott's Mail*.

The next debate, on Health, focuses on youth and wellness. The venue is BB Zondani Hall on Wednesday 17 October at 5.30pm for 6pm.

Die mense is verwyder na sogenaamde "Kleurlinggebiede" op die buitewyke van Grahamstad, waar "Ghost Town" en "Vergenoeg" vandag staan. Dié mense sou leer van vernedering en swaarkry.

As deel van 'n initiatief van die Isikhumbuzo-stigting,

onder leiding van Professor Julie Wells van Rhodes Universiteit, het kleurling voormalige inwoners van Fingo Village op Woensdagmiddag 'n kans gekry om hul stories te vertel. Die byeenkoms is goed bygewoon en almal teenwoordig het die stories volop waardeur - veral die stories van die drie tannies wat na vore gekom het (Tannie Hazel Agnew sit op die geseënde ouderdom van 91 jaar!)

Daar was baie ander stories vertel. Een voormalige inwoner vertel van haar ervaringe as kind toe haar pa die steunwerker van die dorp was. Baie van die stories was


hartroerend, veral dié wat gehandel het oor die verwyderings. Dit was 'n baie emosionele vergadering, maar vol waardevolle ondervindings vir almal wat daar was. Die middag was afgesluit met 'n sessie waar inwoners hulle voormalige adresse kon identifiseer op 'n kaart wat beskikbaar gestel is. Dié mense was verskriklik entoesiasies om te wys waar hulle gebly het en verdere informele gesprekke het na die tyd voortgegaan. 

Stop the violence!

Violence in schools and at universities has become so extreme and spread so rapidly that the Basic and Higher Education ministries have raised the alarm at the highest level – n cabinet.

This followed reports of violent incidents that included the deaths of students at University of Zululand and University of KwaZulu-Natal last weekend. There was also the bizarre and tragic event at a school in the North West, where a 17-year old pupil stabbed a 24-year old teacher to death because the teacher had apparently refused to give the youngster seconds at the canteen, the previous day. His granny told the media that her grandson often went to school hungry and the schools were often his only source of food.

"I call on vice-chancellors to prioritise their institutional protocols on student safety and I intend to meet with them as soon as possible to develop a sector approach to confront this scourge," Pandor said as she announced plans for an urgent meeting with the Council for Higher Education in South Africa (CHE). Like many before (and perhaps after her), the minister blamed alcohol and substance abuse as well as inadequate security at university campuses around South Africa.

However, Ms Pandor's clarion call misses the point, for only a total ban on alcohol on campuses, as well as one-to-one ratio of security guards to students can keep everyone safe from this incessant violence. Indeed, it seems like as a nation, South Africa has refused to acknowledge how much violence exists in this country. According to the recently released Police Crime report, 57 people were murdered every day between April 2017 and April 2018. That is 20,336 murders in absolute numbers, or 35.8 murders per 100 000. This is one of the highest crime rates in the whole world.

There is a normalisation of violence in South Africa, that is mind-boggling, when violence is seen as a necessary and justified means of resolving conflict. As for intimate relations, men have come to believe that coercive sexual behaviour against women is legitimate. Others blame the police; with the related problem of SA's porous borders that make accounting for perpetrators and weapons almost impossible.

There are obviously socio-economic undercurrents to crime, many of which a legacy of apartheid. However, we should be careful not to place everything at apartheid's door. After all, women also suffered during those 50-odd years, but they don't show up as frequently as men in car jacking, Cash in Transit heists, murders, assaults or sexual offences.

One way of acknowledging that crime is out of control is to prescribe sensible deterrents. Sentencing the WSU student who stabbed his friend to 12 years in jail (which is effectively six years) is an insult to the relatives of the victims. Some American states have the so-called Life Without Parole, which is extreme. But can we at least have something in between?

Moreover, all EU countries abolished the death penalty. Yet Luxembourg averages five murders a year!

A taste of SA

Monday 24 September is Heritage Day. Why not try these truly South African recipes supplied by Ali's African Cuisine at Olde 65.

Hearty beef stew with green peas and carrots served with pap and spinach

This stew should be made in a large soup kettle measuring at least 10 inches in diameter. If the kettle is any smaller, you may need to cook the meat in three batches. I like mashed potatoes with my stew. If you prefer potato chunks in your stew, boil them separately and add them to the pot with the carrots and peas.

INGREDIENTS

- 1kg beef chuck, cut into 3cm cubes, or about 2kg beef shank, meat removed from bone and cut into 3cm cubes
- salt
- ground black pepper
- 2-3 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 2 medium-large onions, chopped (2 cups)
- 3 garlic cloves, minced
- 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1 cup full-bodied red wine (Cabernet Sauvignon, Côtes du Rhône, Zinfandel, Shiraz or Barolo)
- 2 cups homemade chicken broth or low-sodium canned broth
- 2 bay leaves
- 1 teaspoon dried thyme leaves
- 4 large carrots, peeled and sliced 6mm thick
- 1 cup frozen peas, thawed
- 1/4 cup minced fresh parsley leaves

PREPARATION

1. Preheat oven to 90°C. Place meat in a large bowl. Sprinkle with 1½ teaspoons salt and 1 teaspoon pepper; toss to coat. Heat 2 tablespoons oil over medium-high heat in a large non-reactive soup kettle; add meat to pan in two batches. Brown meat on all sides, about 5 minutes per batch, adding an additional 1 tablespoon oil if necessary. Transfer meat to a platter.



2. Add onions to pot; sauté until almost softened, 4 to 5 minutes. Reduce heat to medium and add garlic; continue to sauté for about 30 seconds longer. Stir in flour and cook until lightly colored, 1 to 2 minutes. Stir in wine, scraping up any browned bits that may have stuck to pan. Add chicken broth, bay leaves and thyme; bring to simmer. Add meat and return to a simmer. Cover and place in oven, and simmer until meat is just tender, 2½ to 3 hours. (Stew can be cooled at this point, covered and refrigerated up to 3 days.)
3. Before serving, bring 1 inch water to a boil in a steamer pot. Place carrots in steamer basket and lower into pot. Steam until just tender, about 6 minutes.
4. Add steamed carrots and uncooked peas to fully cooked stew; cover and let stand to blend flavors, about 5 minutes. Stir in parsley, adjust seasonings and serve.

Spicy tripe with baked maize meal dumplings

A true taste of South Africa, this spicy tripe with baked maize meal dumplings dish is inspired by SeSotho culture in celebration of our rainbow nation's diversity. The lightness of the dumplings takes the edge off of the tripe's spiciness to create a perfectly balanced dish.

Serves: 6

Cooking Time: 2 hrs 15 mins + 1 hr 30 mins

INGREDIENTS

Dumplings

- 310g bread flour, sifted + extra, if needed
- 10g dried yeast
- 50ml brown sugar
- 250g maize meal
- 100ml boiling water
- 150ml warm water
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- 100g butter, softened

Tripe

- 2 onions, finely chopped
- 45ml (3 tbsp) olive or avocado oil
- 2 garlic cloves, peeled and crushed
- 500g tripe, cut into chunks

- 30ml (2 tbsp) curry powder
- 1L beef stock
- 3 red chillies, sliced
- 3 spring onions, thinly sliced

INSTRUCTIONS

1. For the dumplings, mix together the flour, yeast and sugar. Mix the maize meal with the boiling water and let it soak for 5 minutes. Add the maize meal, warm water and eggs to the flour mixture and mix into a soft dough, adding a little more flour, if needed. Knead, about 10 minutes, cover and set aside until double in size, 1 hour. Knead the butter into the dough, shape the dough into small balls and set aside to rest, 20 minutes.
2. For the tripe, fry the onions in a little oil in a pot over medium heat, 10 minutes. Add the garlic and fry for a further 5 minutes. Add the tripe and curry powder and cook, while stirring, 10 minutes. Add the stock, cover and simmer until tender, 1 hour, adding some water if needed.
3. While the tripe is cooking, the dumplings can be added. Place the risen balls on top of the tripe and steam until cooked through, 10 – 15 minutes.
4. Remove the tripe from the sauce, add the chillies and reduce the sauce until thick, 35 minutes. Place the tripe back in the pot and stir in the spring onions. Serve with the dumplings.

Working in space

What would it take for you to sit atop about two million litres of super-cold liquid hydrogen and liquid oxygen, and then have it ignited to blast you off into space? Only a crazy person, right?

Well, one such crazy person has not only done it – and survived – but he did it four times. NASA astronaut and mission specialist, Dr Don Thomas completed three flights on the Columbia and one on the Discovery as part of the "All-Ohio Space Shuttle Mission".

Thomas is coming to Grahamstown (Makhanda) to tell us about his missions aboard the Space Shuttle and how he coped with the challenges of working and living in space. Currently on his fifth visit to South Africa, he will be speaking at Victoria Girls' High School on September 26.

The educational NGO, Living Maths, invited Thomas to this country once again following the success of last year's three city sell-out tour of his presentation on "Living and working in Space". Thomas says the aim of his visit is to "inspire and excite young learners to pursue careers in the maths, the sciences, and the engineering fields".

He wants to change lives because he was inspired to

be an astronaut when he was only six years old and watched the launch of the first American into space back in 1961. Thomas explains, "Watching that launch on a small TV at my school forever changed my life and motivated me to work hard and always do my best in school.

"So I know the power of inspiration, and together with Living Maths, we are hoping to inspire the next generation of mathematicians, engineers, scientists, and explorers in South Africa".

Thomas believes in the power of persistence as NASA rejected his application to join the space programme four times before they finally accepted him. He says, "I'm grateful to now be one of only 550 humans to have flown in space and feel a responsibility to share my story and experiences. My story is proof that perseverance pays off and I want to pass on the gift".

During his twenty-year tenure with NASA, Thomas logged over 1,040 hours of adventuring in space and completed 692 orbits of the Earth.

He admits that even though he was super excited by his space missions, he was always a little scared, "I frequently tell people I was 10% scared and 90% excited. I think any astronaut who tells you they're not scared are either stupid or

crazy, because you should be a little scared sitting on top of a fully fuelled rocket".

As a mission specialist, three of his four flights were dedicated science flights that involved performing hundreds of experiments, all looking into the effects of zero-gravity. He describes himself as a science enthusiast who always enjoyed learning all he could in the sciences. Thomas explains, "I studied physics at university because I found it powerful for explaining the universe around me. I en-

joy learning new things and discovering things that were once unknown".

He believes that the desire to explore is one of the essential characteristics that make humans unique among all other species. He firmly believes that it is an innate human trait to explore, "For me it doesn't matter what continent you live on, what language you speak, or what religion you practice, humans explore. We cross oceans, we climb mountains, we travel to space and explore the unknown".

Amazing things can happen when people work together with a common goal. Last year the Rapportryers at PJ Olivier High School donated their fun run proceeds to Grahamstown Residents' Association for a project to beautify the city and others added further contributions.

GRA invited interested parties, including Makana Parks Department to meet and discuss how to make maximum use of the donations. Following a presentation by Mike Powell of Rhodes University it was decided to commence a planting project and overhaul for the unkempt and ugly central reservation on High Street.

Mongamo Dlulemyango took on the task of project management, working closely with Kwanele Mbangi and his team from Parks Department. The work has progressed from the Cathedral end towards the University end of High Street. The design is intended to incorporate a theme of red brick and local stone with indigenous drought-resistant planting,

whilst discouraging donkeys sleeping and people walking over the plants.

Makana Parks Department have done the majority of the work, with assistance and guidance from Mongamo. The work will continue to completion over the next few months, though more community support is required to do so. A further highlight of this work has been the readiness of "Car Guards" to engage and support this work. Many have said they are pleased with the improvements and have proved very willing to assist in clearing litter and even watering the plants.

The remaining third of High Street central reservation and the area around Drosdy Arch needs to be completed + gaps filled and finishing touches to

some areas. A design for the Drosdy Arch and opposite island is in progress.

- It requires additional funding, largely to pay for the project management and coordination.

- Adjacent businesses can also help by both sponsoring more bins and encouraging the "Car Guards" to clean up.

While GRA will negotiate to resolve:

- The state of the paving and derelict street architecture such as old parking meter poles requires input from the relevant Municipal departments.

- The decrepit lamp posts need to be fixed, exposed wiring covered, the old decorations removed and repaired if necessary.

A lot has already been achieved on a very small budget by Mongamo, Makana Parks Department, especially Kwanele Mbangi and his team under the leadership of Jeff Budaza

and other participants such as Daniel Kilchenmann.



What is a 'woman's' sport?

The media recently has been filled with talk of Serena Williams, and many believe that her being a woman was part of the reason she was penalised so harshly. This has opened up the conversation yet again about how women are not treated equally or fairly in sport.

"She is not the first player to bang her racket on the ground, male players do that all the time, they also yell at officials all the time," said Annelisa Fani, Sport co-ordinator at Nompucuko Comprehensive School, and manager of Young Ideas ladies' soccer team in Marselle.

This discrepancy in sport isn't just with her though, but rather a worldwide issue where women are paid less, supported less and less televised.

Abenathi Nqweniso, a young soccer player for Grahamstown's (Makhanda's) African Connection said that if she could change the face of sport, she would take away the idea of "a man's sport" and sports like cricket and rugby would be played by all. She believes that South African women who play sport are not promoted like the men

are. "If the government officials would put more focus on sport then that would encourage [women] to be interested in playing sport."

"There's a difference between the amount of people and fans who come and watch men play compared to watching women play soccer," Nqweniso said, and Sanel Sobahle, the sports officer at Rhodes University Sports Admin at agrees.

"Women are not watching sport," said Sobahle. "There's an issue with that in that we don't even support ourselves." She went to watch a netball match in Port Elizabeth where "the seats were empty. It was a televised match ... The coverage was there, but the support was not".

To Sobahle, the issue is deeper than simply sports players. "If you look at the federations, very few females are sitting in those federations."

She said, adding that there are very few people there advocating for women's rights in sport.

Sobahle believes that this issue of gender in sport exists across the country, but at Rhodes "I'm not sure that I feel this whole gender di-

vide. It is there in and across the country." She said, adding that this discrepancy is not "in the same level" at Rhodes University.

Karabo Mavuso, the Chairperson of Rhodes Soccer Committee disagrees with Sobahle however, saying "Sports Admin will always see "Rhodes Soccer" as the men's team, not us."

"There's a history of sports-women not getting the applause and recognition that they need when they represent the university," Mavuso said.

Ongezwa Magopeni, a netball player and student at Khutlisto Daniels believes this too, saying that female dominated sports such as netball are seen as "lesser" and that more male-dominated sports are televised. She says she wants to see a more equal representation of women in sport being publicised.
