Six arrested in R2m dagga bust

In one of the Eastern Cape's biggest dagga busts ever, six people were arrested and 46 bags of dagga worth R2 million were confiscated at Seven Fountains outside Makhandla (Grahamstown) yesterday Wednesday 7 November.

Police spokesperson Captain Mali Govender said a joint operation with members of the Port Elizabeth Flying Squad, Uitenhage K9, SAPS Seven Fountains and Grahamstown Highway Patrol had resulted in the arrest

of the six suspects aged between 35 and 60.

"At approximately 7am K9 team Warrant Officer Jacques Adlem and Sergeant Melisa Adlem acted on information of narcotics being transported," Govender said.

"They located a Nissan Quantum, as well as the lead vehicle, a VW Polo, next to the N2, close to Seven Fountains."

When they searched the vehicle, they discovered 46 large bags of dagga, weighing 980kg with an esti-

mated street value of R2m.

All six suspects were immediately arrested.

Extra police were called in when a crowd gathered outside Pepper Grove Mall around midday, where industrial-sized scales at a retailer were used to weigh the 46 bags.

At this stage it was unknown where the dagga originated nor its destination, Govender said.

Eastern Cape Provincial Commissioner Lieutenant-General Liziwe Ntshinga commended the members

involved in the operation.

"This dagga bust is one of the biggest in the province.

"When we launched the Safer Festive Season Operations 2018/19 in Motherwell last Friday, we committed in ensuring that the proliferation of drugs will be dealt with harshly.

"This bust is the result of that commitment," she said.

The suspects face charges of Dealing in Dagga and will appear in the Grahamstown Magistrate's Court soon.

Dates set for final voter registration

The Electoral Commission has announced the dates for its second and final voter registration weekend for the 2019 national and provincial elections.

The country's 22 932 voting stations will open from 8am to 5pm on Saturday 26 January and Sunday 27 January 2019 to allow new voters to register and existing voters to update and to check their registration details.

The Chairperson of the Commission Glen Mashinini announced the

dates at the media conference in Centurion 7 November 2018.

The Electoral Commission also announced the release of the Atlas of Results for the 2016 Municipal Elections available at www.elections.org.za

All South Africa citizens aged 16 and older in possession of an official ID document can register as voters (although only those who are at least 18 years old on voting day may vote).

Voters should take a copy of their bar-coded ID book, smart card ID or temporary ID certificate when they

go to register in the voting district in which they ordinarily reside.

When registering, voters will need to provide their address or a description of where they live to allow the Electoral Commission to place them on the correct segment of the voters' roll. However, documentation or proof of address is not required.

Voter registration will also be conducted in January in Correctional Centres.

In terms of the Constitution, the term of the current National Assembly and provincial legislatures ends

on 6 May 2019 and elections must be held within 90 days thereafter i.e. between 7 May and 5 August 2019.

Registered voters can visit the Electoral Commission website (www.elections.org.za) to check their current registration details and voting station location, SMS their ID number to 32810 to receive an SMS containing the address of their voting station (charged at R1). Unregistered voters can insert their address in the Voting Station Finder application on the website (<http://maps.elections.org.za/vsfinder/>)

Armed cops in Council

Eight armed police officers and two traffic officials removed two councillors from the Makana Council Chamber on Wednesday, following a heated exchange between members of the DA caucus and the Speaker. Other councillors threw themselves into the fray in an hour of chaos that left Makana's sole EFF councillor shaken after an ANC councillor confronted her at close quarters and saw the DA caucus stage a walk-out for the second time in eight days.

The special council meeting on Wednesday 7 November continued where the adjourned Monday 29 October one left off. This was at the point when the DA caucus of eight councillors walked out last week, forcing the adjournment since only 13 of the 27 councillors (less than 50% plus one) remained in the Council Chamber.

That dispute began when the DA's motion of question regarding Sun City – an informal settlement built on a disused dumpsite – was excluded from the agenda. Councillor Mlindi Nhanha said he'd submitted the motion to the municipal manager on 20 September 2018.

The Speaker's failure to entertain discussion on the issue infuriated the caucus and they walked out.

This time, Speaker Yandiswa Vara insisted that today's meeting was a continuation of the adjourned meeting and that as such, no new items may by law be added to the agenda.

Councillors Nhanha and Brian Fargher objected strongly on points of order. Nhanha cited a letter from municipal manager Moppo Mene apologising for the omission and assuring him it would be included in today's agenda. *Grocott's Mail* has a copy of this letter.

Tempers flared, primarily between Vara, Nhanha and Fargher, but other councillors joined the fray. At one point, fellow ANC councillors intervened when Ward 11 councillor Mncedisi Gojela angrily interrupted new EFF councillor Siyanthanda Dyantyi when

she stood up to speak. She was left shaken by the near-physical confrontation. Gojela was later told by the Speaker to apologise, which he did.

In chaos reminiscent of some of the more notorious incidents in Parliament, the Speaker instructed the municipal manager to bring in law enforcement to remove councillors Nhanha and Fargher.

Councillor Matyumza requested that law enforcement deal also with "the media" for alleged unauthorised documentation of the meeting. *Grocott's Mail* was the only media representative present but was not removed.

At first two somewhat perplexed-looking traffic officers were summoned into the Chambers.

Ten minutes later eight armed SAPS members led by Joza Station Commander Colonel Vivian Tembani entered and Nhanha and Fargher were surrounded by no fewer than 10 law enforcement officers inside the Chamber.

According to a subsequent statement by the DA, there were more officers outside the chambers and another contingent arrived as the councillors were leaving, totalling around 20. *Grocott's Mail* remained inside the Council Chamber and so did not witness the additional officers first-hand.

In a statement released after the incident, the DA said, "The failing ANC government in the Makana Local Municipality has stooped to the level of using the South African Police Service (SAPS) to try and hide its absolute failure. Today, while DA Councillors were attempting to fight for the rights of people oppressed by poverty, the failing ANC called in the SAPS to intimidate the DA caucus."

"Eight armed police officers entered the council chamber to intimidate the DA. Eventually, 20 armed officers forcibly removed Cllr Brian Fargher and I. In accordance with the rules of council, weapons are not allowed in the chamber."

"All of this happened after the DA insisted that its item, to discuss the plight of the resident of Sun City Informal Settlement, be placed

on the agenda."

The meeting continued without the DA, 16 of 27 councillors being present.

The DA last week declared their support for the group of citizens calling for the dissolution of the Makana Council in terms of Section 139(1)(c) and on Tuesday 50 DA members were among a crowd of hundreds of residents of different races, classes and political persuasions who marched on the City Hall to hand over a petition of close to 21 000 signatures to this effect. As of Thursday 8 November, the confirmed total tally stood at 20 758 signatures, according to the organisers.

The local ANC leadership, including councillors in the caucus, was clearly in a mood for confrontation this week. Only last-minute intervention from the Regional Executive Committee prevented the local leadership from staging a counter-march, announced on the eve of the petition march, and in opposition to it.

"Hands off our municipality: ANC march to defend ANC led municipality against the dissolution of Makana Municipality". With overlapping times and routes, the scene seemed set for a conflict.

Questioned about this on the morning of the events, Subregion Chair Mabuthi Matyumza confirmed the counter-march. Ward 7 councillor Malibongwe Kubalo later confirmed he and others from the caucus would join it, as ANC members.

However, the party's REC expressed strong concern about the move. In a letter to local organisers and seen by *Grocott's Mail*, REC chair Scara Njadayi said, "I think the content carried in the Makana ANC Poster of Defending the Municipality is in contrast with the founding principles, tradition and values of the congress movement."

"My understanding is that the ANC is leaning towards the poor and the working class therefore it cannot at any given time be against the masses... The ANC promotes democratic principles and the right of individuals to protest."

Local and regional lead-

ership instead gathered at a meeting at BB Zondani Hall on Tuesday morning. Outside the venue, Matyumza told *Grocott's Mail*: "We decided to arrange our march for another time that we will announce."

Commenting on the petition and the call to dissolve the Council, he said, "You cannot deny that this is a democratically elected Council. What they are trying to do is take a shortcut by dissolving it. There is no shortcut to democracy."

Commenting at the close of the open segment of today's meeting, Vara said of yesterday's march, "These mass actions are not surprising. They are driven by one and only thing – the elections next year. We must always be ready and we must warn residents not to be misled by any Tom Dick or Harry telling them not to pay their rates. They have only one thing in mind – to destroy this municipality."

Beware of the heat

As we approach summer it is important to remember that hot weather can be a serious problem for animals and in particular dogs.

Dogs die in hot cars, even on a mild day temperatures in a car with open windows temperatures can easily reach 60 degrees celsius.

As dogs are unable to sweat and therefore overheat much quicker than humans.

Dogs with short noses, thick coats or health issues should be walked in the early morning or late evening to avoid the hottest hours of the day. Clipping long haired dogs, providing fresh cool water and cool showers can all help keep your dog feeling well in the heat of the day.

REMEMBER dogs should never be left unattended in cars (even with the windows open), even on a mild day the temperature in a car can become unbearable very quickly.

The drought issue is a very real problem in Grahams-town and the surrounding areas, and it is vitally important that all your animals also have access to the water they need.

KGG's name-change objections returned

The KGG's says its submission of objections to the name change from Grahamstown to Makhanda has been returned "unclaimed" by the Post Office.

In a statement on Saturday 3 November, the Keep Grahams-town Grahamstown Campaign said its submission of over 1000 pages on behalf of approximately 10 000 individual objectors had been despatched to the office of the Minister before the close of the 30 day period for the submission of objections after the proposed name change was gazetted on 29 June 2018.

"Proof of despatch was pro-

vided to the Minister's personal secretary, Ms Leonah Smith, together with a copy of the tracking details," said campaign organisers Jock McConnachie and Sigidla Ndumo in a jointly signed statement.

The KGG had also repeatedly written to the office of the Minister with the latest tracking information as obtained from the Post Office website requesting confirmation that the item had been collected.

"No reply was received from the office of the Minister nor did the KGG receive an acknowledgement of receipt of its objection as submitted both via the post and electronically,"

said McConnachie and Ndumo.

"All the KGG received was a reply that objections would be dealt with 'in accordance with the requirements of the applicable Act'."

Those objectors who did receive acknowledgements of receipt of their objections had been referred for comment by the South African Geographic Names Council (SAGNC), the KGG said.

"Those objectors who have received reasons for the Minister's 'final decision' have also been referred to the reasons contained in a letter from the Chairperson of the SAGNC,

Mr Johnny Mohlala dated 14.9.18."

Mohlala's letter states that objections to the proposed name change were the same as those submitted to the SAGNC previously and referred to "some of the issues" already considered by it and rejected.

"The letter therefore advised the Minister that the objections should be rejected for the same reason without explaining the reasons," the KGG said.

"The KGG only belatedly received a similar response to its objection from the Minister but the question now arises how the Minister could consider the KGG's objection if it was never

collected? "We are convinced that the Minister did not himself apply his mind to the objections as the law requires and that his "final decision" was based on the inadequate reasons provided by the SAGNC," the Campaign said.

"The view of the KGG is that Grahamstown is still Grahamstown until a court of law declares it otherwise."

The Minister had not yet formally responded to a request for confirmation and comment at the time of publishing. However spokesperson Asanda Magaqa yesterday told *Grocott's Mail* they were looking into the query.

Ramaphosa speaks on service delivery protests

Service delivery protests reflect severe weaknesses in local governance, poor consultation with communities and a perceived distance between communities and their public representatives, says President Cyril Ramaphosa. He said the government had adopted a multi-disciplinary and systemic approach to tackle service delivery protests.

The President was fielding oral questions in the National Assembly on Tuesday in response to a question from United Democratic Movement (UDM) President Bantu Holomisa. Holomisa had asked the President whether he had any plans to coordinate the entire government machinery to visit affected communities to present them with detailed responses to their concerns.

"If we are to effectively address the causes of community protests and improve the conditions under which people in these communities live, it is necessary to proceed in a systematic manner," Ramaphosa said. "It is necessary to ensure intergovernmental alignment since the issues at hand cut across national, provincial and local competencies."

"At the same time, it is necessary for public representatives – including MPs and Ministers – to engage with communities on an ongoing basis to ensure that their needs and concerns are being addressed." The President said reasons for com-

munity protests ranged from local service delivery failures to broader concerns around crime, municipal demarcation, corruption and failure of governance. He said most of these protests – both peaceful and those that turned violent – reflected the severe weaknesses in local governance, poor consultation with communities and a perceived distance between communities and their public representatives at all levels.

Ramaphosa said the government had established an inter-ministerial task team to enhance integrated planning, budgeting and implementation of service delivery programmes in 57 municipalities. These included the eight metropolitan municipalities, 43 local municipalities and six priority district municipalities.

"Together, these municipalities account for over 87% of all households living in informal settlements or backyard dwellings," Ramaphosa said. "They also constitute over half of all service delivery backlogs and have the greatest number of recorded service delivery protests. The Inter-Ministerial Task Team is being supported by a programme management office at the Municipal Infrastructure Support Agent (MISA), drawing directly on the MISA technical team of professional engineers and planners, as well as professionals from national and provincial sector departments. – SAnews.gov.za

EMS back in action

In a media release issued on 7 November the Department of Health stated it had reached an agreement with unions representing emergency medical services (EMS) workers in the province to end their work stoppage and return to work.

"The illegal strike commenced Friday last week and impacted on operations leading to the stop of operations at ambulance bases," stated the release.

"The department activated its contingency plans to ensure that ambulance users were able to access emergency services and be transported to health facilities.

The workers had embarked on a strike that the department said was illegal, citing non-payment of overtime hours. The department said it had made

the following commitment on the concerns raised by workers:

- The claims for 2003-2011 overtime claims is referred to an arbitration process to make a ruling.
- Overtime claims for the period 2012-2014 will be paid between December this year and January next year.
- The outstanding payment of claims in 2018 between [July and October] this year will be paid during this month.

Eastern Cape Health MEC, Helen Sauls-August welcomed the end of the strike and warned against essential services workers endangering lives of patients by striking.

"We are pleased that the management and unions have reached an agreement on this. We want all our emergency staff to put our patients first and not take actions that puts

their lives at risk," said Helen Sauls-August. She also apologised to the public about the inconvenience.

The Department of Health met with EMS workers in Bhisho yesterday 8 November to sign an agreement and discuss resolutions. Grocott's Mail spoke to a local EMS worker on the morning of 8 November. The worker stated that no resolution had been reached yet and workers were waiting for the outcome of the afternoon's meeting. At the time of publication, Grocott's Mail could not obtain further comment from the worker.

"The contingency plan will remain in use until all workers have reported back to work," stated the department's release. "[The] Department will also monitor resumption of duties in all its ambulance bases in all districts."

Remembering these

Forty million people died in World War 1 – still counted as the most deadly conflict in human history. This town, and country, experienced its share of tragedy in both the first and second world wars, and historian Fleur Way-Jones tells their stories further on in this special Remembrance Day centenary edition.

It does not take much imagination to see the parallels between Grahamstown at the end of the war and Makhanda today: young people at the receiving end of the social destruction caused by politicians' ambition; illness. Then it was the 'Spanish' flu. Today it is a web of dis-ease that comes from a combination of poverty, lack of clear opportunities, and flouting of people's Constitutional rights.

We should know better, after knowing the horror of that conflict, than to think confrontation is a way to make our town, our country or our world better. So far, Makhanda (Grahamstown) has escaped the intra-party violence that has torn communities apart in other parts of the country.

Tuesday's march by citizens exercising their democratic right was vocal but peaceful. The Speaker performed her duty as chair of the municipality's Petitions Committee, facing a vocal and outspoken crowd to accept the petition of more than 20 500 signatures.

But what happened in Council on Wednesday was shocking: law enforcement – particularly armed police – do not belong in a democratic space, and the Speaker needs to explain what law was broken that justified calling in 10 law enforcement officers to remove two councillors.

Anyone practising politics in this town should read the inscription on the monument to the Great War just down the road from the City Hall. Below the angel sheltering a soldier – an ordinary man sent to go out and defend an ideology invented by politicians – the words go like this:

'Remembering these let no man think too highly of himself or meanly of mankind.'

The end of the war – heroes, hate, health and memorials

Historian Fleur Way-Jones describes how residents of Grahamstown experienced the end of World War 1.

The Armistice was signed on 11 November 1918; on 15 November an Armistice Day service was held on Church Square. The Great War had ended. Bonfires lit up the skies on Armistice Day. Christmas would be celebrated in peacetime again. By August 1919 most Union contingents on imperial service had returned to South Africa.

Grahamstown was exhausted after the Spanish Flu epidemic and was counting its losses. What Grahamstown never anticipated was that the joy of returning soldiers would bring a health threat in the form of the Spanish Flu epidemic during October – November 1918.

Trains into town were stopped. The lists of those who died from influenza listed in the local papers far outnumbered those of the casualty lists at various times of the war – about 600. *The Grahamstown Journal* editorial explained, 'The recent influenza epidemic has taken the sunshine out of many a home and the shadow of war still hangs over many a household.' But still the Kowie was a popular resort. But so many did not return home... One cannot write about a town during the First World War without considering the loss and absence of its loved ones and imagining the impact that must have had on their homes.

Grahamstown had its heroes. Alexander and Ethel Munro of Slaaikraal, Grahamstown lost one son, Graham Alexander and a nephew, James Norman: Motor Cyclist Grahame Alexander was killed in German East Africa in 1916 and Private James Norman KIA at the Battle of Passchendaele in 1917. The Cherrys of Warren Street, Grahamstown, lost two sons.

There were casualties right until the end of the war. Private Walter Randall Meaker blinded at Flanders in 1918 was sent to St Dunstan's Hos-

pital to recover and returned to Grahamstown where he lived at his house in St Bartholomew Street until his death in 1953. 2nd Lieut Gordon Robert Craig, an old Kingswoodian and a dentist, died at Flanders in January 1918. Lieut Alan Duthie Bowker aged 38 years died on 24 March 1918 and was buried at Hem Cemetery, Hem-Monacu, Northern France. In the Southwell church, there is a photograph of Roy and Roland Hill in their World War 1 great coats. Lieutenant Roy Mortimer Hill of the South African Infantry, son of Henry Mortimer and Agnes Margaret Hill, died 9 October 1918 aged 33 years and is buried in Bertry Communal Cemetery, France. Roland, son of George Hill of the farm Melville Salem, died 20 September 1917 aged 22 years and was buried at Ypres (Menin Gate). Driver William Bracken of the South African Service Corps died at Roberts Heights on 13 November 1918 in the last days of the war.

One of the youngest casualties was Garnet Sidney Tarr, a 16 year old, whose family lived on Victoria Road, Grahamstown. Garnet died from wounds caused by shrapnel in East Africa in August 1916. Although initially rejected from enlistment due to his age, the young boy left one night on a train for Potchefstroom, leaving only a note for his parents telling them he was on his way to the front. At Potchefstroom he was enlisted into the Hartigan's Horse regiment and went with them to German East Africa. His letter to his mother reads,

"My dearest and loving mother, just a few lines to let you know that I was dangerously wounded today in the stomach. I have been operated upon and the doctor told me my case is hopeless and is a case of hours. Well, mother, forgive me for all my sins and

ask God to help you to bear this great trouble; to look over you and father and the children. Tell them their soldier hero brother died like a man from a treacherous German shell. With love to all at home. I remain. Your fast sinking loving son. Garnie."

A witness to his death wrote to his mother: "he was terribly wounded... he had very little pain afterwards and was very clear and quiet. I told him he could not live and that he had only a few hours... He was beautifully brave and quiet... he said his great regret was your sorrow."

Other families who lost sons were the Cherrys of Warren Street. The casualties in France were dreadful: Company Sgt Major John Wilks aged 23, of the South African Infantry was buried in Thi-epval Cemetery and Lance Corporal Eric Colegate, an old Graemian, only 18 years old, was buried at Ypres Cemetery.

Not all deaths were on the Western Front. Old Graemian, Trooper Francis King Malloch Brown. 22 years, of SA Horse Regiment died of enteric in Kenya in 1916. Women were widowed; children lost their fathers, girls lost their sweethearts. Men returned shell shocked and traumatised. This was indeed the lost generation.

Grahamstown had supported the British Allies for four years from the South West Africa Campaign to the Western Front. Anti-German feeling continued with a number of Grahamstown citizens being targeted: Dr Selmar Schönland, 1st Curator/Director of the Albany Museum, Dr Hermann Francis Becker, a District Surgeon, Mr B Moser, the jeweller in Bathurst Street and Mr Neville Hariton McDermott whose mother was German and worked for the German company, Ritter & Co.

With the war ending it was time to think of memo-

rials. East of the Cathedral stands the bronze Great War memorial of the Angel over the wounded soldier. This sculpture one of nine war sculptures by Gilbert Ledward, himself a Royal Artillery soldier, was unveiled by Mrs Giddy in June 1924. The Great War memorial has this inscription,

"Remembering these let no man think too highly of himself or meanly of mankind." The names of the local men who died are inscribed on the north and south sides of the memorial.

The bronze statue of St George (a copy of the Malvern College statue) was placed in front of College House, Rhodes University (later moved to the entrance to the Great Hall) to commemorate the contribution of the student soldiers in the war. Plaques in the Cathedral, Commemoration Church and Baptist church remember congregants. In Commemoration Methodist Church, Edgar Knight the only son of the owners of Knight's Shoe Shop is commemorated.

At the schools, Kingswood has a plaque in the foyer of the Chapel; St Andrews has the Memorial Tower which was unveiled in 1923 by General Sir Henry Timson Lukin, CO Overseas Brigade. The stone tower designed by architect, Franklin Kaye Kendall, a partner of Sir Herbert Baker, has the names of the 125 Andrians who lost their lives. Headmaster Rev Canon PWH Kettlewell and staff stated, "We think that the visible memorial to the fallen might best take the form of a clock tower... enshrining the names of the fallen. This tower must be a building worthy of those we have lost..." (Andrian, September 1918)

There are many more memorials in St Andrew's Chapel including stained glass windows by William Morris studio. Of the 400 Kings-

woodians who volunteered, 50 died. (15 dying in 1918) Civilian life had been disrupted by the Great War but now it was time to focus on the City's needs and more especially, the state of the township needed immediate attention. Smallpox at the beginning of the war and 'flu' at the end brought health issues to the fore. Fundraising continued throughout the War for the Albany General Hospital and the new hospital called Settlers Hospital built in 1921. The Mayoress' Christmas Appeal raised £69 18s 4d for a party for over 500 children on Fiddlers Green. Motorised toys still had a military theme

and Mr Harris' bioscope still showed "African Mirror" – South Africa's war contribution. But Grahamstown needed to think more of issues at home and its citizens.

This is part of a worldwide event to mark the centenary of the end of World War 1. The time (6am local time) will

be exactly 100 years after the guns fell silent.

At 10.30am will be the traditional Remembrance Day parade in Church Square.

"This Parade is held to pay tribute to, and remember all those who served their country so bravely and paid the supreme sacrifice.

This year is a particularly special one in that we remember the centenary marking the end of World War I," said MOTH member Graham Gooden.

The Kingswood College and St Andrew's College bands will be on parade, as well as

serving members of First City Regiment and the South African Police Service.

The Parade includes a wreath laying Ceremony to honour the fallen.



How we heard the news

Head and Curator of the Albany Museum's History Department Gcobisa Zomelele located coverage by the local press of the end of World War 1.

Grocott's Penny Mail on Monday 11 November 1918 carried the main headline: 'Under the White Flag' – with 'The Fateful Hour' – Foch and the Germans/ Two alternatives: surrender or defeat/ Disaster near at hand.

It took two or three days for news from Europe and England to make its way on to the pages of the local press. A bul-

letin datelined London, Nov. 8, read: *In afternoon wireless French official statement announces that the German plenipotentiaries have received the conditions of the armistice and have been given until 11 o'clock on Monday morning to accept or refuse them. Marshal Foch rejected a proposal for the provisional suspension of hostilities.*

Other headlines on the 11 November edition were:

- The Kaiser Abdicates
- The Red Flag on Top – Revolution spreads/ Soviets in Berlin and Cologne/ Soldiers join in

Herald – latest news' in the second edition dated November 11, 1918 and priced at one penny announced:

- Armistice signed
- Premier's official announcement
- Flight of Kaiser
- Red troops control Essen and
- Baron von Krupp arrested.
